Message from the President



Friends,

With so much hope that the pandemic had begun to subside, then the disappointment of new variants, we ended 2021 with several important things to report. First, many of those round tables that stepped forward to produce their own online programming had an astounding increase in their memberships. It was almost a universal occurrence and one that was completely unpredictable. Congratulations to each of you.

Another thing that happened despite the pandemic is that some round tables and other types of organizations in the Civil War community held in-person conferences and symposia. Most reported attendance similar to pre-pandemic numbers. That is remarkable!

Finally, battlefield tours, round table picnics and other outdoor activities were a very big draw as Civil War enthusiasts joyfully participated for the fresh air, the learning experience and probably more importantly, the sheer fun of seeing old friends and meeting new ones.

The CWRT Congress was very disappointed to have to postpone our 2021 annual conference in the wake of Covid Delta Variant. But that disappointment was somewhat balanced by the praise we received for continuing with our lecture/speaker series and especially for Dr. Curt Fields and “Fridays with Grant” ending the year with our 57th episode. Our new YouTube channel was widely viewed, our Facebook page was rather popular, and we continue to add informative resources to our website.

In addition to urging “dark” CWRTs to utilize online platforms to deliver programs to their members, we initiated an online classroom. As you read further in this report, you will find the topics covered with comments by attendees.

From a more organizational standpoint, we applied for and received a trademark for the name CWRT Congress on the supplemental register. We hope that our logo will similarly be recognized in the coming months.

We also continued to partner with some amazing organizations. For example, our Giving Tuesday partnership with the American Battlefield Trust resulted in over \$1,000 in donations, all of which were sent to the Trust’s Maintenance and Interpretation Division. It also made the Congress a Color Bearer.

We hosted the Society for Women and the Civil War’s online conference in July. Not only did the attendance surpass the Society’s expectations but resulted in several new members. We thoroughly enjoyed using our expertise on behalf of such a great partner.

Finally, we were able to recognize the founding members of the CWRT Congress: Dr. John Bamberl, Matt Borowick, Jay Jorgensen, and Wally Rueckel by presenting them with engraved plaques and several other items.

All in all, 2021 was a pretty good year for the Congress and our many friends and supporters. Thank you!!

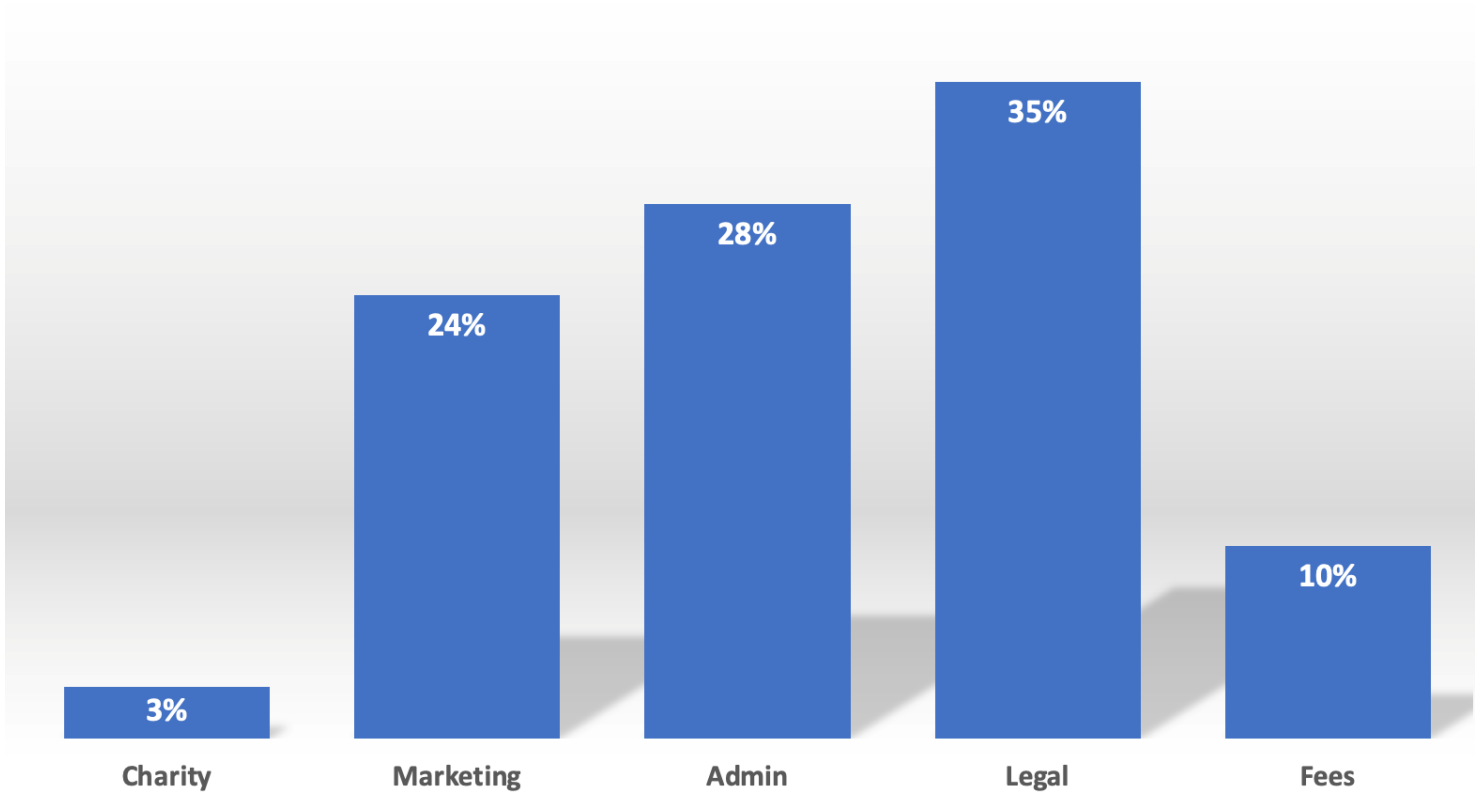
